


A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Over the last 12 months many changes have taken place within FPMT and Atisha Centre, most notably, the passing away of FPMT's Spiritual Director, Kyabje Lama Thubten Zopa Rinpoche, in April this year. Lama



Zopa Rinpoche for almost 40 years, guided and gave direction on the many spiritual activities of FPMT for which he co-founded with Lama Thubten Yeshe. The flourishing community of Atisha Centre, The Great Stupa of Universal Compassion, Thubten Shedrup Ling Monastery and Machig Labdron Nunnery are some of the many projects of FPMT, fulfilling the vast vision of Lama Yeshe and Lama Zopa Rinpoche. In order to maintain the connection with our spiritual leaders, we need to continue to have the motivation to benefit others, and one of the most powerful ways of doing that is to fulfil the vision of Lama Yeshe and Lama Zopa Rinpoche. This is most important.

The Spiritual Programme, with guidance from Geshe Thubten Rabten, and assistance from the sangha members, continues to grow and will continue to do so next year. Sunday meditations, weekend courses, NVC and one-day courses are very well attended and our retreats are always booked to capacity. The spiritual energy generated by our various retreats, is very powerful and a great experience to be a part of. They provide great inspiration to those who attend and to those

who assist in the preparation. It is very encouraging.

I would like to thank Geshe Rabten for his wonderful teachings and sangha members from the Thubten Shedrup Ling Monastery and Machig Labdron Nunnery for their support, and also to Andy Melnic, for coordinating our spiritual programme, and to Jan Stewart, Office Manager, and Pauline Walden for organising our programme and accommodation bookings. It is a very full and busy programme.

Atisha Centre's Board had a few changes during the year with Robyn Ralton (Chairperson) and Lee Lim (Treasurer) resigning in June. However, we were also able to welcome Jill Lancashire onto the Board in August.

Many thanks to Kathy Rice who is leaving us after nearly 20 years in the position of Membership Coordinator. Thank you Kathy for all your hard work.

The most important accomplishment of the Board this year due to the tireless effort of the Board's Secretary, Jan Townsend, was receiving Designated Gift Recipient Status from the ATO. This is an amazing accomplishment as it is very difficult to achieve. It allows for future donations to Atisha Centre's buildings to be tax deductible.

The construction of the Kadampa Stupa continues with Ricciardo Ferrari (builder) coming to Atisha Centre twice a year for 4 weeks at a time. Together with Mark Allaway coordinating the landscaping with assistance from Ken Fox and Steve Williams and his team of volunteers helping Ricciardo, we are hoping to have the Kadampa Stupa completed early next year. This would be a wonderful achievement for Atisha Centre as this was a major project requested by Lama Zopa Rinpoche. Once completed, it will be of great benefit to the community. It is very exciting.

Thank you to all of you for your generous donations and support. It will be a wonderful achievement to complete the stupa and most importantly, fulfil the requests of Lama Zopa Rinpoche.





We have many other projects on-the-go: We have Lama Yeshe's statue in the garden outside the gompa that will be completed shortly; the library is planning an extension allowing for additional storage room; developing a new front entrance gate is being planned; the gold buddha outside the accommodation requires an uplift; a 2m Ksitigharba statue has been kindly offered by a generous benefactor and we are waiting for that to be delivered.

We were able to upgrade the accommodation facilities with the building being painted inside, new carpets and flooring. Airconditioning/heating has been put in all the rooms and we are planning upgrading the bedding and furniture. Atisha Centre's aim is to ensure those who come to the Centre are well looked after and will want to come back again. Therefore, providing comfortable accommodation, good quality food and having a flourishing spiritual programme is most important, and we do that.

To Atisha Centre's Office staff, Andy Melnic, Jan Stewart and Pauline Walden; Steve Williams and Ken Fox for managing and maintaining our property and grounds; Lama's Dharma Shop staff of Robyn Ralton, Arihn Howe and their volunteers; Venerable Chodak for taking on the Kitchen Manager's role and Kathy Rice and Helen Sleswick for continuing to assist with catering, and Pauline, Gail and Aileen for

coordinating the library. Also thanks to Neil, Bill and Kamal who help in the grounds; and Norma, Roxanne, Linley and Kristine for housekeeping support. Without them we would not have any clean rooms in the accommodation block.

In June , I offered my resignation to the Board after 3 years as Director of Atisha Centre. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in the role and I believe Atisha Centre offers a wonderful place for people to study and learn about the Dharma and be a source of refuge for those who have a connection with the Centre. I would like to say thank you to the Atisha Centre Board for their support over the last 3 years. The support offered to me has been overwhelming. We have been a very harmonious board and I feel that that is reflected well within the community.

Overall, the Centre continues to do well. We have a wonderful geshe and our community is very unique as no other community that I am aware of has a Buddhist centre, monastery, nunnery and a Great Stupa. It is vitally important we continue to work together and offer service from the heart, fulfilling the wishes and prayers of His Holiness the Dalai Lama, Lama Yeshe and Lama Zopa Rinpoche, then our Dharma community will continue to grow, making the Dharma more accessible and being of great benefit to others.

MESSAGES FROM THE BOARD - SECRETARY

Thank-you for the opportunity to serve a second term in the position of Secretary on the Atisha Centre Board. It is a pleasure to collaborate with such dedicated and passionate members of the Board. Venerable Dondrup continues to be a source of inspiration; his commitment and contribution knows no bounds.

The Board has met 10 times over the past 11 months. With Board members spread across Bendigo, Melbourne and Wodonga, most of our meetings have been facilitated by Zoom.

Atisha Centre continues to meet its obligations with federal and state government regulators: Australian Charities and Not-for Profit Commission (ACNC), Australian Securities and Investment Commission (ASIC), the Australian Tax Office (ATO) and Consumer Affairs Victoria (CAV).

This year Atisha Centre achieved a major milestone by meeting ATO requirements for Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status for a school building fund. Yes! We have finally done it! Donations to the fund will be tax deductible for the donor. The fund can be used for the acquisition, construction and maintenance of Atisha Centre buildings that meet the criteria for a school building (which is most of our buildings). The ATO has strict governance requirements for the fund. Financial and administrative procedures and processes are being established to ensure compliance, and withstand scrutiny by the ATO and ACNC. Receipts will be issued for donations to the fund so that you may claim them as a deduction at tax-time.

The account name will be "Atisha Centre Inc School Building Fund". The BSB and account number will be advised soon.

Thank you for the opportunity to continue in service to the Atisha Centre community as we work together to realise the aspirations of Lama Yeshe and Lama Zopa Rinpoche.

I dedicate any merit I have generated through my actions to all sentient beings. May they be free from suffering and quickly attain complete enlightenment.

This year, our Buddhist Study Group topic from Genla has been, "The Middle Lam Rim", a commentary on the text by Lama Tsongkhapa, explaining in great depth the stages on the path to enlightenment. Genla's great attention to detail makes this a very rich and inspiring course of meditation and pure practice Dharma.

Genla also started our new Wednesday Night Teachings' topic with his commentary on Shantideva's famous text "Bodhisattvacharyavatara": "Engaging in the Bodhisattva's Way of Life". Many thanks to Venerable Dorje for his superlative interpretations.

At Easter we completed a 5-day retreat, where Genla taught on "Spiritual Advice for a Heart-Disciple" by Gendün Gyatso ,the 2nd Dalai Lama. Many people attended and Venerable Tsapel led the meditations

and discussion sessions.

For our Winter 5-day retreat, Genla taught on "Verses Urging to Take the Essence of this Human Life" by Lama Tsongkhapa. Again this retreat was well-attended with Venerable Tsapel leading meditations and discussions.

"Lama's Dharma Shop", our book and gifts shop, continues to improve and gets more exciting all the time, under the management of Robyn Ralton who retired mid-year, and lately of Arihn Howe. Thank you to all the hard work from Robyn and Arihn and all their volunteers who serve in the shop.

The "Publications Project" continues to record and document Geshe



Rabten's teachings. Gail Haig has recently come on board to train to take over this project. We are always looking for more volunteers to be involved. All the teachings given by Geshela are available online as audio files, together with supporting handouts. Most of Geshela's teachings have also been videoed and are available on Youtube.

LIBRARY

The library has focused this past year, on meeting the goals set in 2022 of preserving photographs, converting VHS tapes of teachings to MP4, that date back to the 1980's. It has been another good year in Lama's Dharma Shop with total sales at \$94,793 for the 2022/2023 financial year. With shop sales contributing \$82,029 and \$12,764 through our online store, \$1,305 in plant sales and a generous sum of \$2,185 given in donations.

Seeing these figures, it is

easy to appreciate how valued this little shop is to our Dharma students and the wider community as a whole, and we could not do it without our wonderful team of volunteers. A big thank you to Cilla Brady, Fiona Silver, Ken Fox, Pauline Walden, Lou Payne, Brian Ashen and newcomers Warwick Shepcott and Neil Bowker who provide a welcoming face to our many visitors.

A special mention goes to Robyn Ralton who since 2018 has volunteered her expert management skills and worked tirelessly in creating an asthetic of quality resource books, Dharma objects and practice items for the benefit of all who visit Atisha and our beloved Dharma Shop.

We are all thankful to Robyn who retired from her position as shop manager in June of this year and wish her the best in future endeavours. I am grateful to have received such excellent tutorage. Thank you Robyn.

Throughout this year we have continued to update and beautify the shop, both inside and out, and most recently a fresh coat of paint and rearranging of the signs and posters outside has given the shop entry a fresh appeal. Thanks to the maintenance team for their efforts.

It is joy and a privilege to meet and greet the many visitors who flock to Atisha, whether for retreat, for study or just to enjoy the quiet

surrounds or marvel at the Great Stupa of Compassion. I am happy to be part of their experience and exploration of Buddhism. A big thanks to all who shared their appreciation and support for Lama's Dharma Shop throughout the year.

PROPERTY

The summer of 2023 ended with a good rain event in January, which filled all the dams, and more good rains fell in February, March and April. The winter has been long and mildly wet; last year we had double the rain of this year. This spring the eucalypts are enduring an early attack from caterpillars and are showing quite a lot of browning off. The grass is still green and is starting to dry off now. We have needed to buy water for our tanks as the meagre rains are not keeping them topped up.

The maintenance team has continued with their wonderful work of improving and maintaining the infrastructure of Atisha Centre so that it can function smoothly and provide the setting for the transmission of the

Dharma.

The plinth for Lama Yeshe statue has been rendered and now needs to be decorated and roof construction in the next phase.

The ultraviolet levels are very strong at the present time and this is accelerating damage to exterior surfaces of buildings and statues. The maintenance team



continues the repair and rejuvenation of buildings,. The final coat of paint went on the front wall of the shop. Courtyard furniture is being repaired and repainted. There is a need to paint the shop, office, kitchen and toilet block roofs due to rust and deterioration. This is part of next year's ongoing maintenance. The Shakyamuni Buddha statue is showing signs of serious damage due to ultraviolet and I will be covering it with a tarp to stop further damage until it can be repaired by a specialist.



Stage 4 of Kadampa stupa has been completed and Ricciardio returned on the 5th of October to work on stage 5 of its construction. The 13 rings have been laid and rendered and the umbrella and top should be attached by the 5th of November when Ricciardio returns to his home at Chenrezig Institute.

Extra parking spaces have been created for the nuns near the track to the gompa. I plan to make a path from accommodation, around the back of toilet block to the kitchenette to make it easier for guests to navigate their way. The accommodation verandas have been sanded and sealed and this will be given another coat at the beginning of winter each year to protect the timber. Extra solar carpark lights will be installed in strategic places for safety of guests as well as more 12v led path lights.

It continues to be much fun to work with Andy in the Office, and light and easy sharing of the Office Manager role with Pauline. It has been impressive to see Arihn step into the Shop Manager role so effortlessly, and admire her fresh ideas for our shared

space (and simultaneously miss Robyn who has moved on).

It will be a bit sad and strange for Venerable Dondrup not to be with us next year, however we give many thanks for his amazing service as Director and wish him all the best in France. And walking into the office each time and seeing the Dalai Lama's meditative pose above the office desk is the perfect reminder of why we are all here.

Machig Labdron nuns' community

In June last year we obtained Planning Permit Approval from the Bendigo City Council for a two story nunnery. We then engaged Penno Drafting and Design to prepare construction plans. During that process an error with the design set us back. Penno suggested either (1) to adjust the design to allow for a larger accessible stair to meet regulations or (2) avoid stairs with a change to two one-story buildings, each under 300sq m, that would be easier to construct and may be nicer to live in, if we had the room.

Some months earlier, Ian Green offered us the flat pad adjacent to our site. A welcome additional space that improved the peaceful

to design two one-story buildings on the new site. Planning Permit Amendment for the new design was approved in March this year.

Once engineering, thermal report and Penno's construction plans and documentation were complete, we invited three local builders to quote on the build. With building cost increases all three quotes were scarily high. Tact Constructions was successful, with the best revised quote and the best suggestions for cost cutting measures,

while retaining design and thermal integrity.

Adjustments to the construction plans and other documentation are underway with the aim to apply for a second Planning Permit Amendment. The earliest now to begin is around February 2024. Now our focus has changed to the practical need of creating our own legal entity. Clear aims and structure will assist us to develop a strong responsible community, able to satisfy changing community needs as we continue to make a positive contribution to the



various dharma activities onsite and in the wider FPMT and general community.

Special thanks to Atisha Centre primarily for accepting us as a project over this process. And thank you also to our kind benefactors and friends who believe in and support our aims for a stable community to last a long time.



FINANCES 2021/22

FINANCIAL REPORT


The 2022/23 financial year has seen Atisha Centre report a small profit of \$5,000, significantly lower than last year. However, this result is largely due to expenses relating to upgrading the accommodation



facilities (\$63,000) which incuded new carpets and flooring, painting, bedding and airconditioning/heating, additional work on the Kadampa Stupa and increase in offerings to Geshe and Translator offerings. Donations compared to the previous year were not as high. This is mainly due to a large donation received last financial year. Generally,

donations were still very good which allowed us to make some improvements to the gompa.

Even though there was a slight drop in sales with Lama's Dharma Shop,



the shop still had another good year.

Total income for this year increased again on top of another good year previously, mainly due to the above and further increases in accommodation and course income. Accommodation income increased by over \$7,000 and course fees increased by almost \$25,000. Membership remained steady and annual donations were good too.

There has been a large increase in total expenses in comparison to last year. The increase in expenses relate to the continued construction of the Kadampa Stupa, accommodation facility upgrades, improving facilities in the gompa with air conditioning and an increase in the Geshe and translator offerings. With the increase in gift shop sales there has also been a corresponding increase in shop expenses as more stock has been purchased to keep up with the increase in sales.

Additional expenses include insurance, accounting fees and utility fees.

Atisha Centre makes regular offerings to the following


- \$50 to TSL Monastery


